HINEMOANA BAKER (NZ)



Hinemoana Baker (Ngāti Raukawa, Ngāti Toa Rangatira, Te A-ti Awa, Kāi Tahu, England, Germany) is a Kapiti Coast musician, poet, creative writing teacher and occasional broadcaster. In 2004, her first album, *puāwai*, was a finalist for the NZ Music Awards, and her first poetry collection, *mātuhi/needle*, was co-published in New Zealand and the US. Hinemoana was Arts Queensland Poet in Residence in 2009 and spent three months at the University of Iowa's International Writing Programme in 2010. *Supported by APRA/AMCOS*. hinemoana.co.nz

FLEUR BEALE (NZ)



Award-winning New Zealand writer Fleur Beale has had more than 30 books published locally and internationally, including the acclaimed *I Am Not Esther* for which she won the Storylines Gaelyn Gordon Award Book for the second time, having previously received it in 2007 for *Slide the Corner*. Fleur was the 2009 recipient of the Esther Glen Award for *Juno of Taris* and, in 2011, won the LIANZA Young Adult Fiction Award and the NZ Post YA Book Award for *Fierce September*, the second in the *Juno* trilogy. The third in the series, *Heart of Danger*, was completed last year. **fleurbeale.com**

EOIN COLFER (IRE)



Artemis Fowl author Eoin Colfer grew up in Wexford, Ireland. He first developed a passion for writing in primary school, reading Viking books inspired by his history lessons. In 2001 the first of the Artemis Fowl science fantasy books was published and Eoin was able to resign from teaching to concentrate fully on writing. He has since completed seven novels in the series, with the eighth and final one to be published in 2012. In November 2011, Artemis Fowl and the Atlantis Complex won the UK's Independent Booksellers Prize. Eoin lives in Ireland with his wife and two children. Supported by Penguin. eoincolfer.com

MARTIN EDMOND (AUS/NZ)



New Zealand-born Martin Edmond has lived in Australia since 1981. He is an accomplished writer of non-fiction, biography, essays and screenplays including works about the painters Philip Clairmont, Ludwig Becker, Rex Battarbee and Albert Namatjira; his *Dark Night* – *Walking with McCahon* was published in 2011. His non-fiction writing is highly creative in its exposition, merging genres and exploring larger questions raised by his immediate subject matter. *Supported by the Australia Council.*

CHRIS GROSZ (NZ)



Chris Grosz is a book illustrator, painter and political cartoonist who has worked extensively in Australia, New Zealand and Asia. In 2011 his graphic novel *Kimble Bent: Malcontent* was published. It tells the tale of a 19th century American soldier in the British army in New Zealand who deserted and went to live with the Hauhau, eventually becoming known as 'the Māori Pakeha'. David Hastings is the editor of the *Weekend Herald*. He has worked in daily journalism for more than 40 years and has been a reporter and sub-editor in newspapers and radio, as well as a television news producer. David was news editor of ABC Television in Melbourne in the mid-1980s and in Auckland has previously held positions as foreign editor, news editor and deputy editor of the *New Zealand Herald*.

OLIVER JEFFERS (UK/US)



Oliver Jeffers writes and illustrates irresistible, witty picture books for all ages, including *Lost and Found*, *The Incredible Book Eating Boy* and the upcoming series *The Hueys*. Oliver studied visual communications, graduating with First Class honours from The University of Ulster in 2001. He has since exhibited internationally and won several awards, including the Nestlé Children's Book Prize Gold Award, the Blue Peter Book of the Year Award and the Irish Children's Book of the Year Award. ANTHONY MCCARTEN (NZ/UK)



Anthony McCarten is an internationally successful novelist, playwright and director/writer now based in London. His 2006 novel *Death of a Superhero* won the Austrian Youth Literature Prize, was a finalist in the German Youth Literature Prize and was made into an award-winning film. 2012 brings the publication of his follow-up novel *In The Absence of Heroes*, which explores a family's grief over the death of a teenager and the ways in which they each immerse themselves in digital worlds.

PAULA MORRIS (NZ/UK)



Award-winning novelist and short-story writer Paula Morris is the author of two YA supernatural mysteries: *Dark Souls* and *Ruined*. She has taught creative writing outside New Zealand since 2004, first in New Orleans and now in Scotland and has contributed to Victoria University Press's new creative writing handbook *The Exercise Book*. Paula's latest book *Rangatira* brings colonial New Zealand and Victorian England to life through the eyes of Ngāti Wai rangatira Paratene Te Manu. **paula-morris.com**

MAL PEET (UK)



Mal Peet is a writer of exceptional talent who has established himself as a strong and distinctive voice in young adult fiction and won major awards including the Carnegie Medal and the Guardian children's fiction prize. His acclaimed novels include *Keeper, Tamar, The Penalty* and, most recently, *Life: An Unexploded Diagram*, a brilliant coming-ofage story set against the backdrop of the Cold War which has garnered impressive reviews. Mal has also collaborated with his wife, Elspeth Graham, on the Kate Greenaway Medal shortlisted title *Cloud Tea Monkeys.* He lives in Devon. *Supported by Walker Books*.

EMILY RODDA (AUS)



Emily Rodda grew up in Sydney and has been a fulltime writer since 1994. She has written or co-authored more than fifty books for children, ranging from picture books to YA novels, including the outstandingly successful Rowan and Deltora Quest fantasy series. Winner of the Children's Book Council of Australia's Book of the Year (Younger Readers) Award a record five times, alongside the prestigious Dromkeen Medal, Emily is an exceptional storyteller. Victor Rodger is an award-winning playwright and scriptwriter of Samoan heritage. Born in Christchurch he worked as a journalist before attending Toi Whakaari Drama School in Wellington, later going on to study writing for film in Amsterdam and take up a Fulbright-CNZ Pacific Writers' Residency at the University of Hawai'i. Much of Victor's theatre work deals with race, racism and identity including the plays *Sons, Ranterstantrum* and *My Name is Gary Cooper.* Since 2000 Victor has been a writer for New Zealand's iconic soap opera *Shortland Street.*

DAVID VEART (NZ)



David Veart is an archaeology enthusiast, an anthropologist, a Programme Manager (Historic) for the NZ Department of Conservation / Te Papa Atawhai and a member of Auckland Council's Heritage Advisory Panel. He is passionate about history, archaeology and education for children and has published two books: *First Catch Your Weka: A Story of New Zealand Cooking* (2008) and *Digging Up the Past: Archaeology for the Young and Curious* (2011).

IAN WEDDE (NZ)



Ian Wedde is New Zealand's current Poet Laureate. An accomplished poet, novelist, art writer and critic, his job as laureate is to be an advocate and a public presence for poetry, promoting the reading and writing of poetry to children and adults alike. Ian, who has also worked as the head of art and humanities at Te Papa, lives in Auckland, and teaches in the departments of English and Art History at The University of Auckland.

01. EOIN COLFER — ARTEMIS FOWL

YEARS 5-10 - 10.00-10.45AM - ASB THEATRE

Eoin Colfer is the author of the hugely successful Artemis Fowl science-fantasy series, starring teenage criminal mastermind Artemis Fowl II. Witty and funny tales, enjoyed by boys, girls and adults, the last in the eight book series, is due to be released in 2012. The books have also been turned into graphic novels and a film is currently in development. Eoin is a gifted and entertaining speaker who will talk about the invention of Artemis, including a series of very funny anecdotes about his family who influenced the books, show a trailer and answer questions from fans during this entertaining and inspiring forty-five minute session.

02. OLIVER JEFFERS — THE INCREDIBLE BOOK ARTIST

YEARS 5-10 - 10.55-11.40AM - ASB THEATRE

Oliver Jeffers draws beautiful pictures and tells great stories in award-winning books that delight children and adults alike. His tales have been described as explorations of 'friendship, loneliness, independence and imagination' and include *The Incredible Book Eating Boy, Lost and Found, The Heart and The Bottle*, and *How To Catch a Star.* An accomplished artist, he has said that he became passionate about picture books when he began to understand the subtle relationship between words and pictures and the way a few words can change a picture's meaning. In this special session Oliver will draw live on stage, while his stories are read aloud, alongside answering questions about his art and his books.

03. DAVID VEART — NZ ARCHAELOGY FOR THE YOUNG AND CURIOUS

YEARS 7-10 - 12.30-1.15PM - ASB THEATRE

An insightful combination of New Zealand history and archaeology, David Veart's *Digging Up the Past: Archaeology for the Young and Curious* (2011) brings together his passion for education and his strong local knowledge with his love of the discipline. The book begins with human arrival and explores how people have learned to live in Aotearoa/New Zealand, both Māori and Pakeha, in camps, quarries, mines and cities. David Veart has been fascinated by archaeology since reading a book on the treasures of Egypt as a child. "When I was a child, I thought of all archaeology as being associated with exotic locations like Egypt. Our place is just as exciting if we know how to look," he says.

04. EMILY RODDA—FICTION & FANTASY

Emily Rodda is one of Australia's most successful and popular writers. She has written or co-authored more than fifty books for younger readers, from picture books to YA novels including the much-loved Rowan and Deltora Quest fantasy series and the first of her new The Three Doors trilogy. Her books are full of magic and mystery, with great characters and beautifully crafted plots. Emily is passionate about the importance of developing an appreciation of literature in children and has worked extensively with educators and children to encourage a love of reading and stories. She will talk about her work and storytelling.
